
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1 Message from our Chair

Much of today's news is about the woes of recession; recent good times have given way to what feels, for many, like deprivation. While economic shocks hurt us, our society has the resources to absorb them. But what if it didn't? What of those for whom an insecure livelihood and the trappings of poverty constitute 'business-as-usual'? This historical moment offers an opportunity for solidarity with those in greater need, and also to reflect on the relevance of our professional sector in an age of global change. With unemployment rising and the construction industry stalled, we are waking up to the limits of our training: when times get tough, there's not very much for architects to do.

The work of ASF is now more important than ever, and for two reasons. Firstly, ASF is committed to helping those with urgent needs – needs arising from disasters and emergencies, or development needs. And secondly, our education and training portfolio is geared towards making design practice relevant to the wider world. We want architects to break out of the gilded cage of luxury services so that our profession is equipped to contribute to development for all, rather than just a privileged few. As this document shows, ASF has once again delivered a range of international workshops, talks and consultancies, winning prizes and support through sponsorship, donations, and funding programmes over the last year. Highlights included a workshop in Nairobi, at which ASF organised a conference in partnership with UN-HABITAT, courses in Leh and Accra, and a series of speaker events in London. We want to build on this success, extending our programme's positive impact on students and professionals.

Public belt-tightening has a devastating impact on the third sector, and corporate giving is naturally scaled back in straitened times. For the last eight years ASF has shown itself able to make a little go a long way, but what we need now is a more solid footing for the charity. With its substantial portfolio and dedicated volunteer staff, ASF is now ready to consolidate its operation. The cornerstone of our action plan is a drive to raise funds on the basis of corporate and institutional sponsorship. By inviting new partners on board, offering opportunities to support and engage in our activities, we aim to establish a more distinctive, visible, and influential role for ASF on the horizon of the construction industry and the built environment professions.

Our Philosophy



ASF-UK's Objectives

- 1. Raise awareness and increase understanding of global development issues amongst practising architects and built environment professionals in order to have a positive impact on the lives of those who are disadvantaged and vulnerable.
- **2.** Foster change in the culture of architecture, to make it more relevant and meaningful in the context of global development issues.
- **3.** Integrate understanding of global development issues into the education of architects.
- 4. Diversify the skills of architects and built environment professionals to make them better equipped to work effectively with their local partners to improve the lives of vulnerable communities worldwide.
- **5.** Advance the contribution of architects in the international development arena by encouraging and facilitating their involvement with government, NGO and voluntary organisations working in development and emergency programmes.
- **6** Create appropriate and meaningful architectural responses.

ASF-UK's Philosophy

ASF-UK believes strongly that local communities should be determining their own development and any external players should be building capacity and helping to facilitate the change needed. Through partnerships with national NGOs in both 'developed' and 'developing' countries, ASF-UK has organised international workshops where students have learnt on the ground. Since ASF-UK started the organisation has been questioning what can and should a built environment professional do in challenging contexts working with vulnerable people. We are not suggesting our approach is the only way, but it is a way for built environment professionals to embrace a social and environmental agenda. ASF-UK feels that there are challenging contexts on our own doorstep as well as further afield, and that our skills as building professionals can be invaluable if used appropriately. A working methodology grounded in community engagement, which is at the heart of ASF-UK's mode of practice, is relevant to a multitude of contexts and capable of adding value in all project scenarios.

ASF-UK's Approach

By testing different strategies for engaging students, professionals and communities, ASF-UK has developed an approach that sits comfortably alongside our philosophy. ASF-UK believes that learning is most valuable when grounded in real contexts, tackling real problems and testing solutions in a hands-on way. Theory without practice can often lead to misinterpretation. Equally, practice without any theory and research can lead to over-simplification of complex local issues. ASF-UK applies it's approach predominantly through a series of national and international workshops, where students are immersed in a field-based environment working with real people and challenging contexts. No ASF-UK workshop takes place exclusively in the classroom or in the field, but rather the process of learning is always a balance of the two. ASF-UK strives to ensure workshops do not exist in isolation but take place at a key stage or start of a project to generate ideas and direction, which rely on a strong relationship with our local partners. Being involved with ASF-UK is not just an avenue for architects, but all building and environmental professionals and community placemakers. Working with a range of people, we find ways of sharing knowledge and building capacity at the same time. We are all learning together.



Rapid urbanization, growing inequalities and increasing demand for land are posing critical challenges for cities in the global south. This workshop aimed to engage participants from a variety of backgrounds in a hands-on process exploring participatory slum upgrading, which recognizes residents as active agents of change rather than passive recipients.

This workshop looked at practical ways of improving the safety, sustainability and the suitability of the learning environment of the Government Girls School in Leh. They addressed short, medium and long-term needs for the school through design and prototyping, including a new toilet block.

Local vs. Global: Ghana- www.asf-uk.org/local-vs-global-ghana-2011



I have been able to convince quite a number of my architect friends to embrace the idea of sustainability - Local Ghanaian participant

In Ghana the team explored how a rapidly developing country with an acute housing crisis is increasingly turning its back on local construction in favour of western principles. The workshop reflected on how needs could be met in sustainable and locally relevant ways creating livelihoods and better environments. Through primary research with local NGO's, expert consultants and community members carried out hands-on design and construction as they searched for a synthesis of local and global strategies for a sustainable future. One outcome of the workshop was a test structure for a local NGO to be used as a seed bank for an agricultural

initiative; demonstrating the materials and technologies that were tested during the workshop, which also created a dialogue with the local community around these issues. The workshop included a symposium with UN-Habitat which was held in Accra facilitating wider exchange of ideas around sustainability and housing in Ghana.

ASF-UK was asked by the University of Reading and the University of Khartoum to conduct a three day workshop, as part of the British Council funded Delphi project between the universities, in order to expose Sudanese built environment professionals to participatory design. The main objective was to encourage participants to rethink their roles moving away from the role of the 'provider' towards the position of an 'enabler' through a series of participatory practical exercises and experiments.

Katherine Johnson, one of the workshop facilitators, stayed longer in Leh to manage the design and construction of a new, safe and sustainable toilet block for the school. This replaced one of the toilet blocks that had partially collapsed during the floods of August 2010, and had been left in a desperate and dangerous condition.



Organised by Tangentfield a team of architects, engineers, timber framers and builders were charged to design and build 4 stages in 4 days for performers at the WOMAD Festival in 2011. Andy Edwards (ASF) and Bill Flinn (CENDEP) facilitated a team of 16 architecture students to design and build a stage made entirely from reclaimed timber and coppiced hazel.

Participation/Drawing for Development

Participation/Drawing for Development workshops were held in the University of Manchester and the University of Sheffield this year for the Article 25 Chapters in both universities.

Talks

This year's series of talks was kindly hosted by Grimshaw Architects in their London Office. The talks were informative and interesting and many people stayed after each talk to share insights about their potential role after a disaster over organic beer and wine.

Other Achievements in 2011 and 2012

Following the Nairobi workshop the team co-authored a book entitled Change By Design, our first downloadable ASF-UK publication www.asf-uk.org/documents.

One of the members of the team who developed the workshop in Kenya nurtured a partnership with the UN Habitat to convene two very successful symposiums, one in Nairobi as part of the Change by Design workshop and one in Accra as part of the Local vs. Global workshop, which was developed by the team who ran the workshop in Ghana.

ASF-UK continues to give one off talks for Architecture Societies around the country and contributed towards the 'Participation in International Practice' evening event convened by RICS.


ASF-UK would like to congratulate them all on their wonderful achievements and thank them for their kind donations.



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
