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NHS Long Term Plan key points

- patient focused (family focused) with participation
- **new model designed on pathways**
- **all parts in place and working well together** (integrated)
- includes proactive prevention (anticipation)
- clinical leadership.
- ethos cooperation, not competition.
- **“triple integration”** integration community and primary care, physical/mental, 1^o 2^o 3^o
- **meaningful measures**, feedback, quality improvement
- Introduces Population Health Management

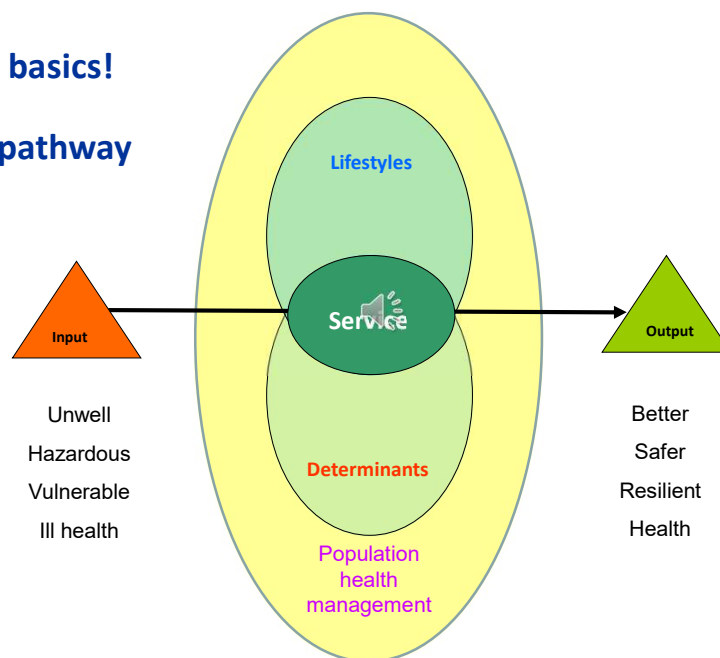

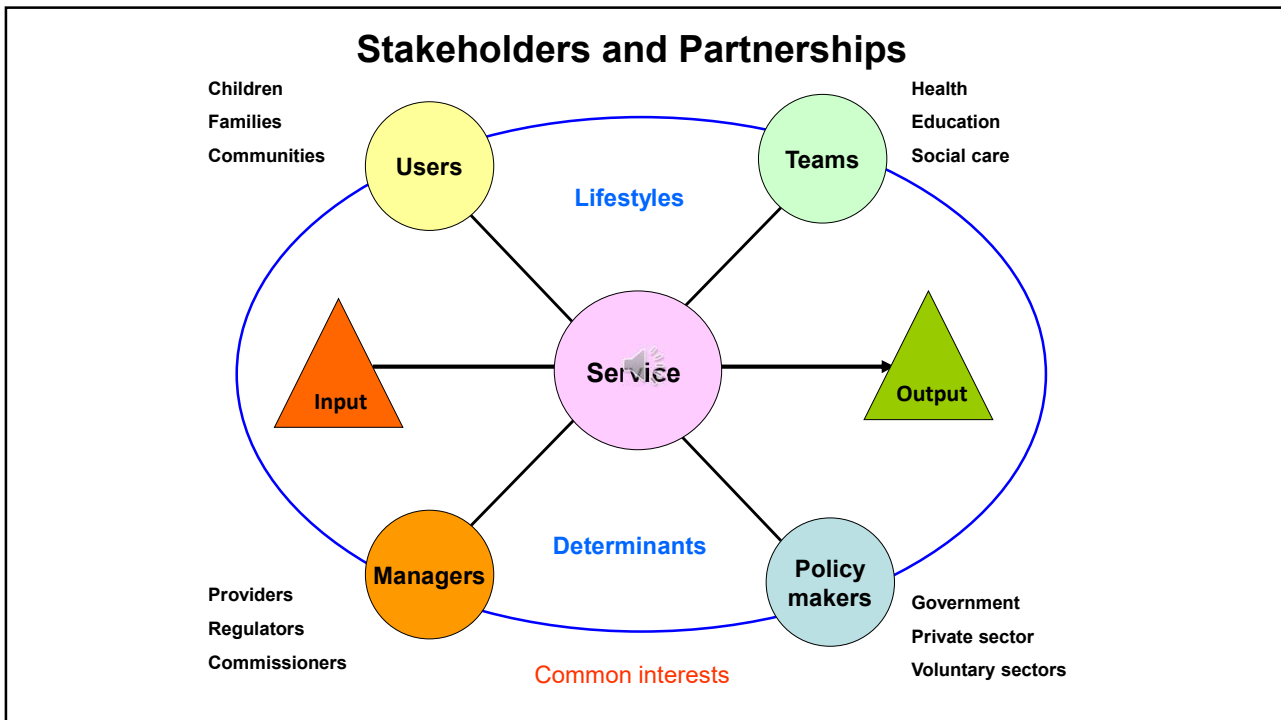

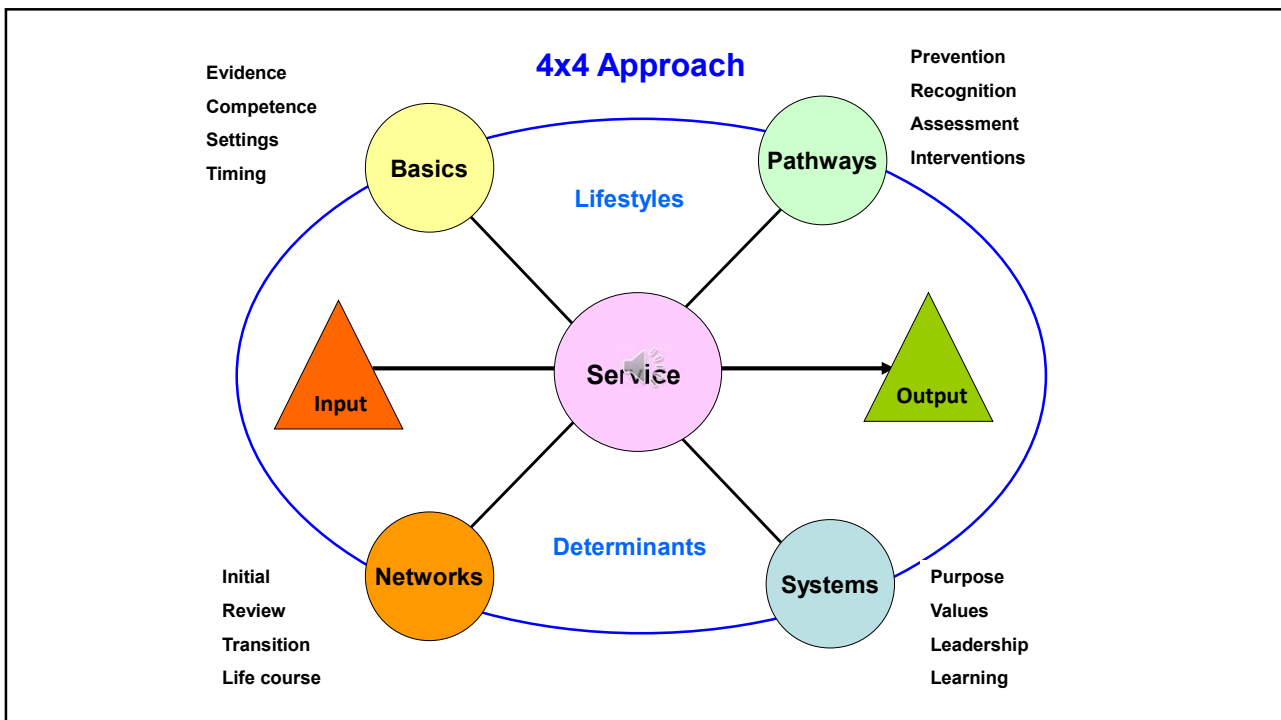
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Integrated Service Pathways



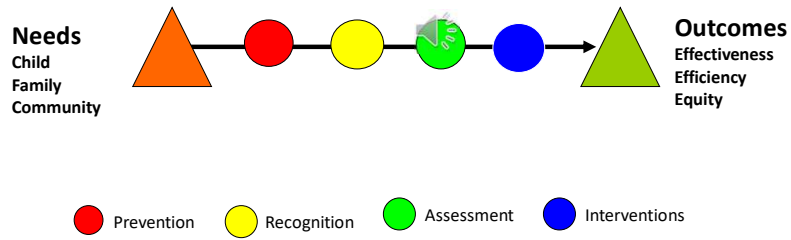
Basic components.

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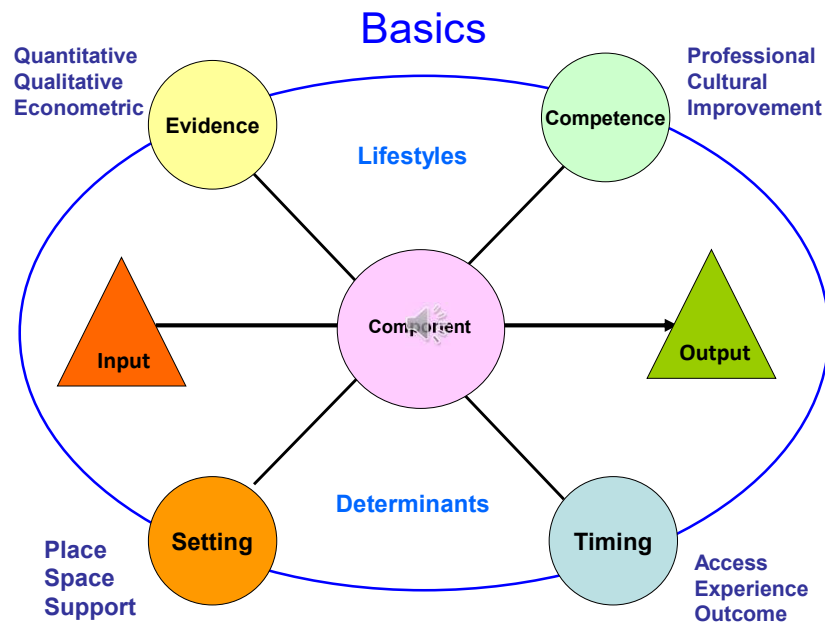


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Short term condition pathway component parts

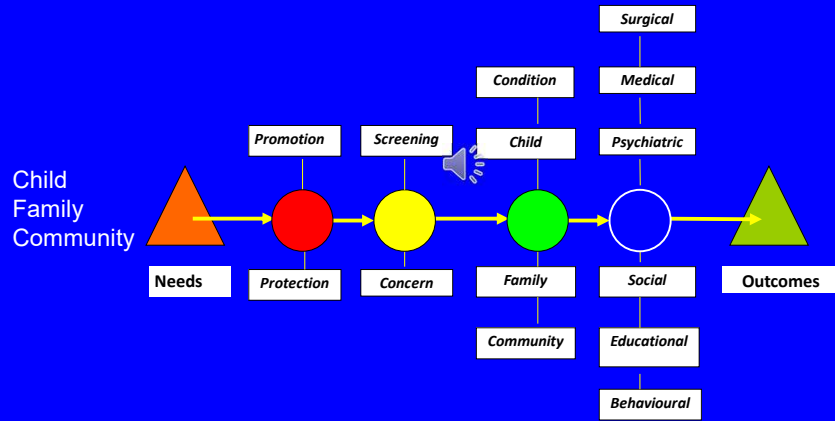


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




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Component parts of a pathway

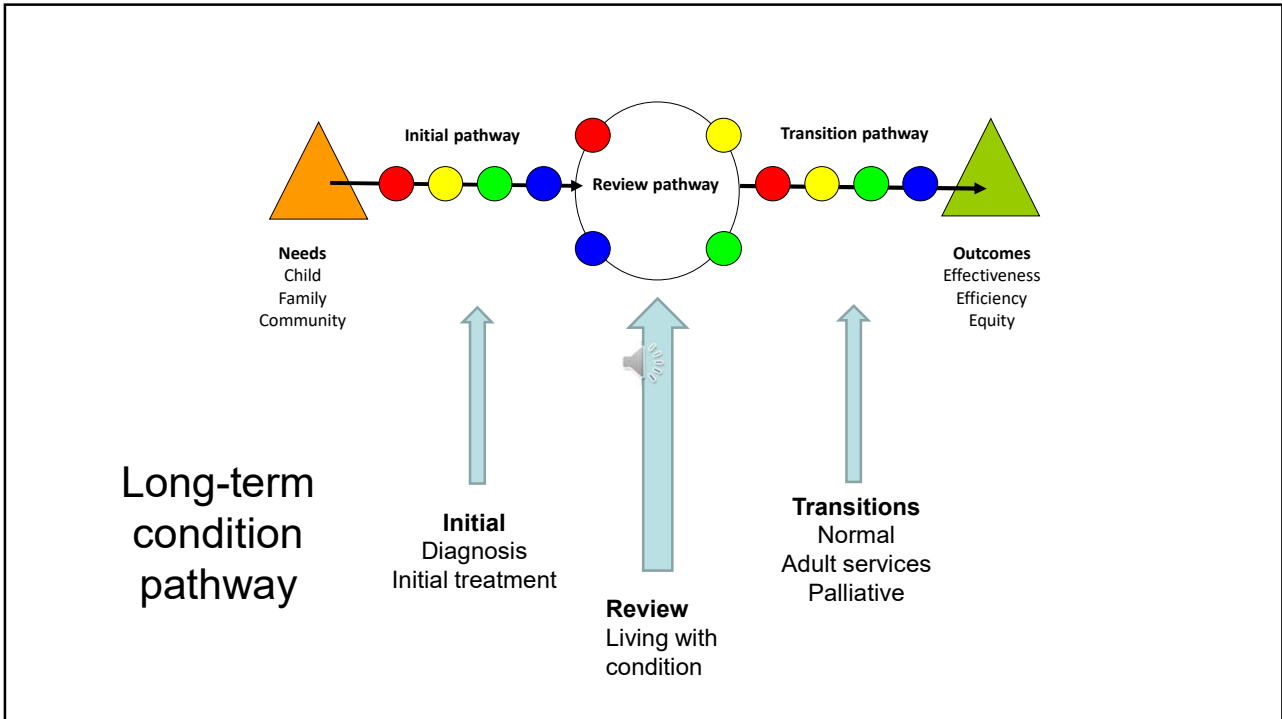


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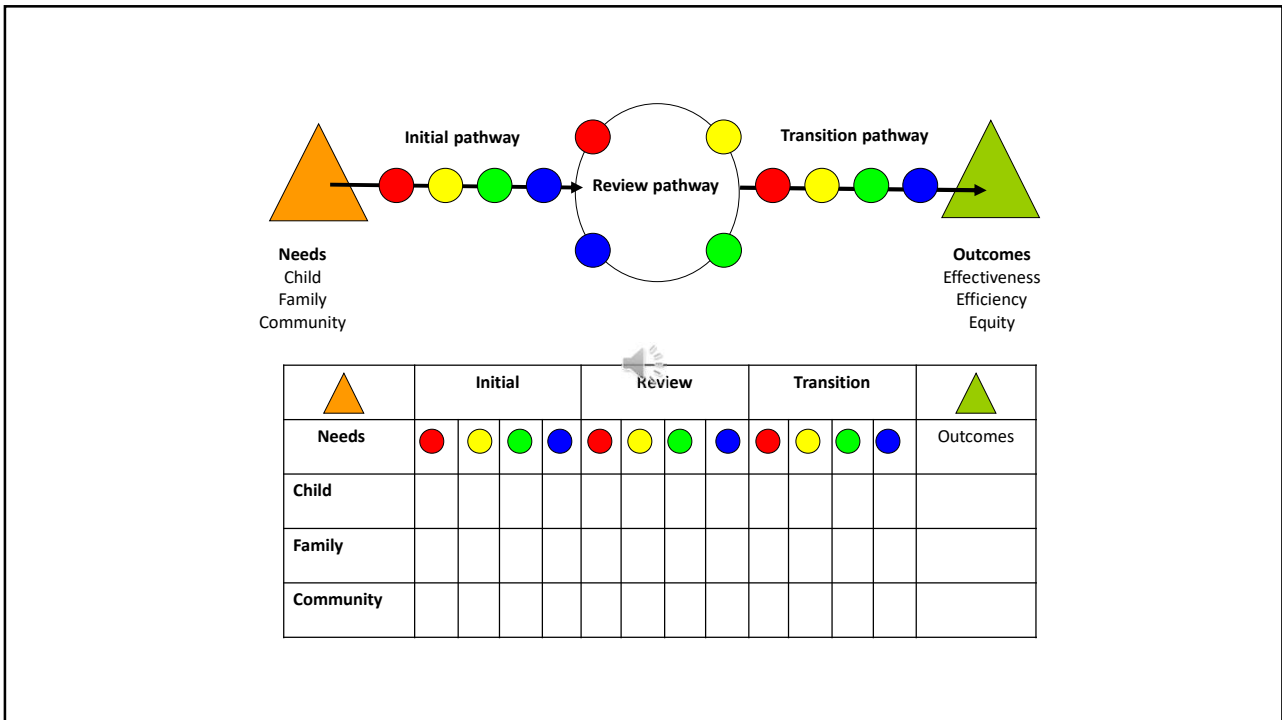

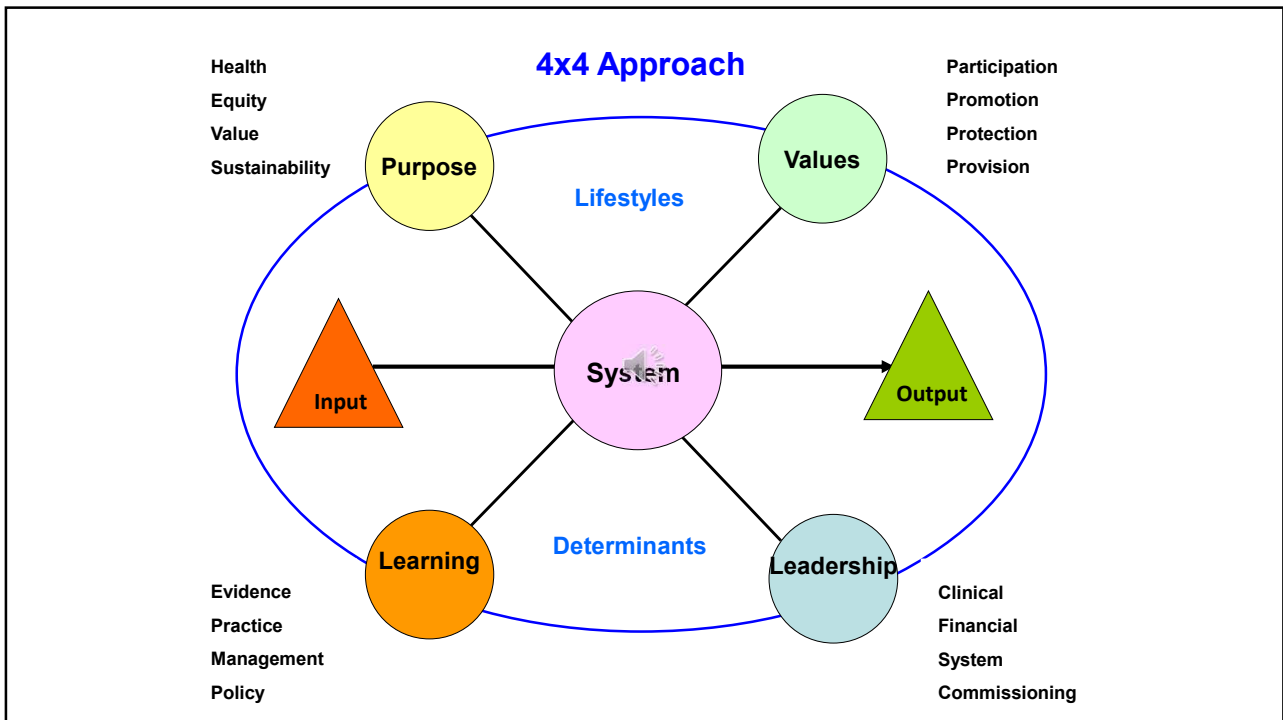
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Service pathways

Example
ADHD

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Review phase outcomes

ADHD network	
Purpose	Outcome
Appropriately manage ADHD, reduce school absence to a minimum, reduce exclusions	% patients school attendance (year cohorts) compared to school mean
Appropriate referral for resistant ADHD	% Referred to specialist centre
Access to CAMH specialist	% Accessing specialist treatments
Manage co-morbidities related to ADHD	% With diagnosed co-morbidities
Support families	PREM

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Summary

- Care pathways are central to service provision.
- Ensure all parts in place (structure).
- Then working well (process).
- Achieving purpose (outcomes).
- Measurement – feedback.
- Leadership essential.
- Learning – at every level.
