

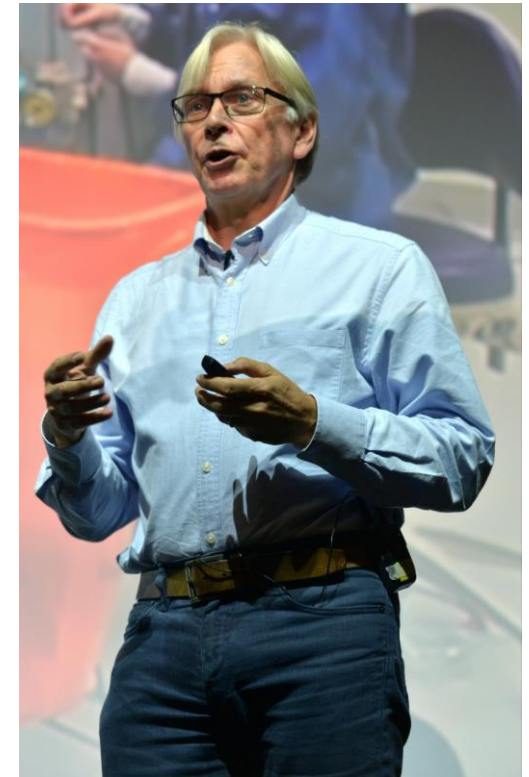
Evidence and Excellence in Perinatal Care

Martin Elliott is Professor of Cardiothoracic Surgery at UCL & Emeritus Professor of Physic at Gresham College. Until 2015 he was Medical Director at Great Ormond Street where he has worked since 1984. He is a NED at the Royal Marsden Hospital, London and at Children's Health Ireland.

He has led research into the pathophysiology of cardiopulmonary bypass, outcomes and clinical databases and tracheal transplantation and is widely published. He has held several international visiting professorships and teaches and operates throughout the world.



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Why is this a hot topic for neonatal professionals?

“Doctors are not immune to the delivery or receipt of ‘fake news’. A small proportion of the population lie regularly and may do so in publications. Using personal experience of such a liar, I will discuss the impact on colleagues, patients, science and trust. I will suggest how the medical publishing industry is complicit and suggest ways in which we need to improve.”



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What do you see as being the greatest challenge for neonatal professionals over the next ten years?
(And how can we best prepare for this?)

“Budget, workforce and demand.

We must research new ways of working, automate as much as possible, accept AI and thus collect more data and use more them widely. We must build trust in our ‘customers’ that their data are safe.”

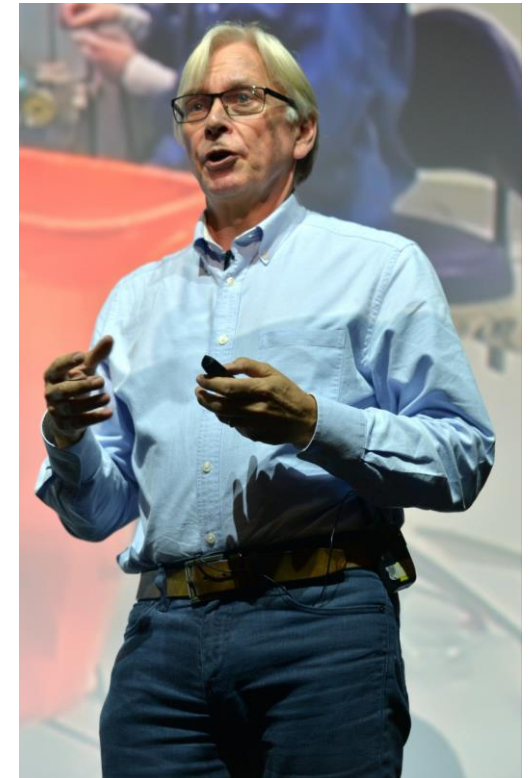


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How do you make the most of your time when attending conferences?
