Brooke Ouinteros, a Macmillan speech and language therapist for people with head and neck cancer, said "I could never adequately describe the benefits a support group gives to patients, carers and professionals alike," she went on to explain that "a friendly, informal, supportive atmosphere really helps to boost confidence, provide insight and establish longlasting friendships for all involved."

Rev. Robert Ellis of Palma's Anglican Church and Portals-based Dr. Michael Stoma were both enthusiastic about the idea that something was finally being done to alleviate some of the trauma for patients and carers of this modern scourge.

"Sufferers can experience the whole range of emotions from anger and denial to intense loneliness and hopelessness when they are diagnosed," Krista explained, "they may need information about eating well or the physical changes they are experiencing, or need advice for financial or relationship problems they are suffering as a result of their condition, the Cancer Support Group will be ready to listen and help as much as possible."
