Van Gogh was a Dutch artist who became one of the world most famous painters. He used powerful brushstrokes and vivid colours, yellows, greens and blues in an inventive and unusual way to express his inner feelings about life.

Up till recently he was considered to be an uneducated painter iust because he was poor. But his letters to his brother show he read and studied widely in art and literature. He tried many jobs such as



in a bookshop, as an unpaid teacher in a small boys' boarding school in England, a post in a church as well as studying at an Art School.


He struggled to fit in because he suffered

from extreme responses to life. He sometimes had moods of 'indescribable anguish'. Once he entered an asylum in Saint-Remy de Provence and

remained there voluntarily continuing to paint as much as he








Today in our society many people experience hardship in their lives even though many believe a civilised society should be including and helping all.



He also created wonderful pictures of the city such as a café at night-time or the natural world of cornfields and starry night landscapes.



At that time it was also extremely difficult to make a living. His brother Theo gave him a little money but it was scarcely enough to eat and find a tiny room to live and paint in. Van Gogh carried on painting even though he was very poor and could not sell his paintings.

He was born in 1853. Previously most pictures were of rich people and great houses and estates. Van Gogh was unusual because his pictures were of people who were ordinary workers, such as his local postman in Arles and of those who had no work and struggled to find somewhere to live. He painted what he saw.



Perhaps his work is so much loved because he survived feeling like an outcast, having struggles with his mental health and living on little, while his paintings show us what a powerful and thoughtful individual he really was.


POLLUTION LEVELS PLUMMETED




