- 26th to 30th September 2016
- Explored beyond Bucharest to regional areas identified through assessed information and preliminary research

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- Domestic abuse and family homelessness
- 2 Residential projects
- 20 families being supported (combined running cost of €90,000)
- Unable to assist UK agencies reconnect Romanian nationals but...
- Can help returning Romanian nations once they arrive in Bucharest
- Happy to assist with advice, guidance and access to professional network in Romania
- Run by an Englishman!



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Casa loana

A NEW BEGINNING

- Samu Social Mobile Day Team
- Covers most of the City
- Gare De Nord and 'sewers' off limits
- Floating support/outreach hybrid focusing on families
- Rented accommodation, squats, bashes
- Emphasis on access to education (children), health and welfare benefits



samusocial International

- 18 to 35 years
- Well funded
- Focus on Roma, former street children and orphans
- Night service can take up to 60
- Structured day program based around skills development and social enterprise
- Can accept referrals from UK agencies subject to criteria





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- Municipal shelter
- Direct access or referrals from services including police
- Emergency shelter in winter accommodates up to 200 (rooms of 70+)
- Regular accommodation for low support, work focused individuals
- Max 1 year





- Harm minimisation service focusing on reducing HIV infection rates
- BBV screening, BBS, mobile ambulance/NX
- Free substitute prescribing for HIV+ clients
- 15RON per dose or 550RON monthly programmes





Trip 2: Brasov, Bacau, Iasi



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Phase 1: Brasov



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Brasov

- Population of the city: 253,200
- Administrative centre of Brasov County





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Municipal Shelter and Director of Social Care

- Emergency shelter, residential hostel and a day service
- Local connection to the city of Brasov
- **Day service**: emphasis on rehabilitating clients back into society
- **Night shelter**: 50 client capacity, max stay for 6 months
- Residential hostel: Main criteria to have a job and contributions are required after 3 months





Bucuria Daruliu Foundation

- Faith based day-centre for homeless and people on lowincomes
- Café (social enterprise) providing free food for people on less than 500 Lai per month
- Limited employment support provision and religious counselling





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Apata - Brasov

- 25 miles from Brasov with a population of 3100
- 1700 Roma, 1200 Hungarian, 200 Romanian
- The main occupation is agriculture and some are commuting to the closest city to work in factories or construction
- Minimum wage is: 185£/ month -10-20£/day for working cash in hand
- Couple of hundred of people are working in UK



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Phase 2: Bacau



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Bacau

- Population of the city: 144,307
- Main city in Bacau county



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Director of Social Care at the City Hall

- Limited services no NGOs working with homeless people
- Emergency shelter, November
 March, 30 beds
- Building a new shelter with 50 beds and local connection criteria
- Stated that they only have 10-15 homeless people in the city at present
- No alcohol or substance misuse services



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Phase 3: lasi



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lasi

- The largest city in Eastern Romania
- Population: 290,422





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Director of Social Care and Municipal Shelter

- 60 person capacity
- Maximum stay for 1 year
- Self referrals but also people who are found during winter outreach shifts
- Focus on reintegration and move-on
- Social workers who assist to find employment and private accommodation
- Support with alcohol use
- Onsite Dr and Psychologist




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Emmaus

- International partnerships and exchange project
- No local connection criteria
- 2 projects: a shop and a farm project 40km away from the city
- Main criteria is willingness to engage
- Low-medium support needs
- Self-referrals and from outreach shifts
- Projects are self-sustaining



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Emmaus: Shop Project



- Maximum stay for 6 years, capacity of 25
- Equipping residents with skills to become independent
- Residents have to pay a contribution; they will earn around £140 per month in the shop and pay for accommodation and food (around £60 left over)
- Support to find employment and private accommodation
- Private house for residents who find employment (£10 per month)



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Emmaus: Farm Project

- Residents live and work on the farm
- Most residents have learning disabilities
- Residents can stay indefinitely but support with move-on is available
- Produce crops and keep chickens, cows and pigs
- Produce is used to sustain residents
- Bric-a-brac shop





Casework & Referrals

Headlines...

- Case prep forwarding documents that aid planning and casework prior to travel
- Challenges to reconnecting clients without determined local connection
- Caution expressed about capacity to support MH clients
- Preference for work to go through Samu Social
- Samu Social willing to consult on cases where mediation with family is required, but they cannot bring them into homeless services in Romania



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Main findings

- 1. Different perspective on economic migration
- 2. Little available social housing (0.04% of total stock?)
- 3. Strong focus on young people/education
- 4. Strong focus on rehabilitation and move-on from hostels/shelters
- 5. Access to health services is limited and dependent on the client having health insurance
- 6. Access to alcohol detox in hospitals, but private rehabs are expensive
- 7. Mental health services under the most strain
- 8. Support for heroin users focused on Bucharest
- 9. Corruption and bogus systems rife in social care sector
- 10. Lots of enquiry from wealthier European states
- 11. Romanian rough sleepers v Romanian's rough sleeping in the UK with access to housing in Romania
