The life of Dr. Albert Schweitzer 1875 - 1965



The green valley and the village of Günsbach where Albert grew up.



Born in 1875 in the Alsace, here he is aged 16 or so, with his family.



When he was 21, Schweitzer made a decision which shaped the rest of his life. One fine Spring morning, looking out across the beautiful green valley, he thought that he was a very lucky man - and he made a promise to himself:

He would continue his academic career until he was 30 and then find some way of serving humanity without having to use words.



Here you see the 29 year old university professor of philosophy and theology and housemaster with his students.



As his 30th birthday approached he decided to go to Africa as a Doctor. He gave organ concerts to earn money to build a hospital there.



8 years later he qualified as a medical doctor, married his friend Helene Bresslau and together they sailed for Africa in 1913.



Albert and Helen settled in Lambarene, in a country called Gabon. They founded a hospital there.



Soon after their first arrival in Africa, Helene and Albert learnt how to navigate on the river Ogowe in a dug-out canoe.



They started treating their first patients in a chicken coup.



Within months, hospital buildings at the river's edge, where patients arriving by canoe with their families had good access, had started to take shape.

Having given up a flourishing academic career to become a medical doctor, and to finance, build and run a hospital, he nevertheless found time to continue with his philosophical writings for the rest of his long life.
