More Flexible Lease Agreed with Oxford City Council

Up until recently, WOCA's lease with the City Council only allowed us to sub-let one specific area of the centre, the Geoff Franklin Rooms, now home to the Oxford Community Health Hub. This was a historical anomaly, dating back to when those rooms were occupied by the doctor's surgery.

WOCA has now secured a 'deed of variation' which allows us, with the consent of the City Council, to sub-let other areas of the centre - as long as it is in accordance with our constitution, and a good level of open access community use is maintained.

This is significant, because it means in the future WOCA will have much more flexibility in how it makes use of the building, depending on the needs and wishes of people in West Oxford.

WOCA would like to say thank you to Susie Preston of Knights plc, a colleague of trustee Martin Bourne, a West Oxford resident, and (with her family) a frequent user of the centre, for carrying out the application so that this variation could happen.

Grading Success for chief instructor

We are pleased to announce that Sensei Martyn King, chief instructor at Oxford City Shotokan Karate Club has passed 5th Dan (5th degree black belt) at his first attempt.



Sensei Martyn took the grading at the end of a gruelling 3 day international karate course in Crawley this month. He was graded by the visiting instructors from JKA (Japan Karate Association) headquarters in Tokyo. On the grading panel were Sensei Imamura - 8th Dan Chief Administrator and Technical Director of JKA Word Federation, Sensei Kurihara, 5th Dan, 2 times World Champion & 7 times All Japan Kata Champion, & Sensei Ohta, 7th Dan, chief instructor of JKA England.

ACT Now programme update

With 30 households signed up and two workshops under our belt, ACT Now is going well. At our November workshop, Gary Irvine and Saski Huggins talked insulation, electrical appliances and home energy.

Did you know? A few tips from the talk... A whopping 80% of home energy is used to heat the space and water in your home. To keep your home warm this winter and cut heating bills, the most important thing you can do is **insulate** your walls. The average semi-detached house loses $\sim^1/_3$ of heat through walls; after walls, next is roof insulation (because heat rises), then floor insulation, then tackling general drafts and last of all, windows. Not sure if you have any of that? Our expert home energy assessors can help...

How many lights do you have in your home? The average home has 25 lightbulbs, going up roughly one a year. They use a small amount of overall home energy individually, but collectively, use 20% of our home energy. They're worth changing to low energy ones even if they're not broken.

Beat the waste this winter: make your own crackers and get busy for the birds!

We got a shock when we discovered our photo of a small plastic eyebrow comb from a Christmas cracker had become a meme and been shared 85,000+ times on facebook! In the shared post, not created by us, it was accompanied by the suggestion of boycotting crackers to avoid the plastic waste they generate; but the original photo came from our 2018 blogpost about how to make your own, rather than any suggestion that you give up a tradition many people love.

Cracker contents ideas: * personalised jokes * chocolates * pack of seeds * charity shop jewellry * give each person one piece of a puzzle to do together * or go big, and roll up a ticket to a show...

Look after wildlife this winter, with 3 simple actions:

Our friends at Earthwatch's Naturehood project have identified the 3 actions everyone in Oxford can take this winter, which will have the biggest positive impact on the wildlife around us. What can you do from this list?

1. Install houses for hedgehogs

Put up nesting boxes for sparrows
Provide homes for insects using leaf piles, log piles and compost heaps - i.e. if you have a garden or shared green space, keep at least part of it messy, which sounds pretty easy!

If you don't have your own garden or shared green space, can you encourage a local business to do something on the list instead?

We continue to develop our therapeutic projects – from our Evergreen Activity Club that offers exclusive pampering sessions to the wise and wonderful of our community, to meaningful supported work sessions for individuals with a wide variety of complex, physical and mental mixed ability groups. We work closely with our partner organisations.
